Girl power has existed for a long time. For example, the pilot Amelia Earhart showed amazing girl power. First, she broke the woman's altitude record when she rose to 14,000 feet on October 22nd, 1922. On June 18th, 1928, she was the first woman to fly across the Atlantic Ocean, which was a 20 hour and 40-minute flight. In Fall, 1928, she published her first book, 20 Hours 40 Minutes, regarding her flight over the Atlantic. On July 5th, 1930, she set the speed record for 181mph over a 3K course. On May 21st, 1932, she, yet again, flew over the Atlantic but this time was the first woman to solo. She also flew solo nonstop coast to coast on August 25th, 1932. But, unfortunately, all her flights came to an end when she started the flight around the world and disappeared on July 2nd, 1937, in the home stretch of finishing her flight.

Before she achieved her achievements, many people underestimated her and thought she was incapable because she was a female; but she was persistent and proved them wrong. Girl power is so important in everything. It not only is an image of self-confidence, but it empowers other females to be the best that they can be, and that's what really matters! Generally, girls are less confident than boys so lifting them up is super important.
