
Girl Powered: A Door to Endless Opportunities Space Cookies VEX: Team 1868N Hi, my name is Lorraine, and this my story.



My desires to create, construct, and contribute were being crushed. I felt pushed to the outskirts, once again.




After a year of being stuck in this endless cycle, I decided it was time to move on. As a result of copious amounts of research, I came across an all-girls robotics group, Space Cookies.




What is Girl Power?
