I knew that they were a good team, they just weren't really in the spotlight. I was honestly a little uncomfortable whenever speaking to girls, and I didn't know any of them well. What finally convinced me to join was when I was talking to our teacher Mr. Rakos. He has always been a role model to



me, he teaches all of the Engineering/STEM classes at Sandy High School. Mr. Rakos told me about the struggles Valkyrie has gone through, they were a two person team during their freshman year however gained a new freshman member the next year, then one of the


